When I think of things and people that have reached 75 years I think of Dr. Tony Knopp and, of course, myself. It takes a certain amount of grit and determination to survive this long.

I moved to Brownsville in 1967 right before Hurricane Beulah, after completing my architectural degree at the University of Southwestern Louisiana in Lafayette. My plan was to work here for a year before

returning to New Orleans to live with my folks and continue my architectural career. As one person told me, "you made the mistake of drinking the water here".

Allow me to relay some of the events that have occurred during these years... and the people who have championed our cause...


- 1. 1969 Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin walking on the



Exhibit: War & Peace on The Rio Grande, 1861-1867

Location: Historic Brownsville Museum

641 E Madison Street

Duration: April 5 - July 30, 2022

Description: The Brownsville Historical Association, in collaboration with the University of Texas-Rio Grande Valley, will host "War and Peace on the Rio Grande, 1861-1867," an exhibit designed, developed, and produced by the Community Historical Archaeology Project with Schools (CHAPS) and regional museum consultants. The exhibit recounts the Civil War era from 1846-1876 and how it affected the Rio Grande Valley, using panels, pictures, artifacts and manneguins dressed in the attire of the era.

Dedication of the Brownsville Heritage Resource Center In the early 1990s, the Brownsville Historical Association purchased the 1880 building and lot located next to Stillman House Museum. The newly annexed Brownsville Heritage Resource Center would serve as a space to house the growing collection of documents and photographs, and a place for patrons to research the history of the area.

Robert "Bob" Vezzetti, a native of Chicago, graduated from the famed VanderCook College of Music in 1954 and obtained a position as a middle school band director in Brownsville. After a stint with a US Army band, Bob returned to Brownsville and became Director of Bands in 1958. In 1974 he was appointed Director of Music Activities for BISD.

Bob was committed to the Brownsville Community, serving on

the City Planning and Zoning Commission and twice as President of Charro Days. A primary aspect of his commitment involved the history of Brownsville, and he served several terms as President of the Brownsville Historical Association in the 1980s-1990s. In 1982, Bob and Ruby Wooldridge co-authored Brownsville A Pictorial History, and Bob later published Tidbits, a collection of historical articles about the City.

In recognition of his decades-long leadership of the BHA, the events and exhibits room in the Heritage Museum is named in his honor.
