# The Smithsonian Comes to Brownsville

The Brownsville Historical Association is proud to present Water/Ways, a traveling exhibition from the Smithsonian Institute's Museum on Main Street Program, which will be on display from September 21 - November 6, 2021 at the Historic Alonso Building.

Water/Ways features a selection of photographs, objects, film audio and interactives to explore the endless motion of the water The BHA will be the only organization to receive the Smithsonian traveling exhibition in South Texas. Before arriving at the BHA's Alonso Building, it will have traveled to the Brazos Valley African American Museum in Bryan, Texas and the Chisholm Trail Heritage Museum in Cuero, Texas. After its time at the Association, it will later be installed at Midland College in Midland, Texas; University of Texas--Permian Basin in Odessa,

Texas and the Centennial Museum and Chihuahuan Desert Gardens in El Paso, Texas.

"This exhibit has been at least three years in the making!," said Collections Manager for the BHA, Aubrey Nielsen. "We are very thrilled to have this opportunity here in Brownsville. I really view this as a launch pad for bigger, expansive, and creative-thinking exhibitions for our museum."

The BHA will develop complementary exhibits, create public programs and facilitate education initiatives to deepen people's understanding of what water means culturally, socially and spiritually in South Texas.

During the month of

September, you will have the opportunity to attend a "Sip N' Paint" scheduled for the 23rd at the Alonso Building. At this event, you can socialize and sip on your drink of choice while you follow along step-by-step with a local artist as you create a one-of-a- kind masterpiece. We are excited and working to program events in conjunction with Water/Ways for the months



cycle, water's effect on landscape, settlement and migration, and its impact on culture and spirituality. The exhibition looks at how political and economic planning have been affected by access to water and control of water resources. Designed for small-town museums, libraries and cultural organizations, Water/Ways will serve as a community catalyst to spur conversations about water's impact on American culture. The exhibition will travel to six sites across the state of Texas over a one-year period.

# In Memoriam: Dr. Theodora S. Budnik



Dr. Theodora Stillman Budnik (nee Mary Theodora Stillman), 75, succumbed to the effects of ALS on June 8, 2021 at her home in Poughkeepsie, NY.


Theodora, known as Theo all of her life, was born on December 15, 1945 in Manhattan, NYC, to

Theodora Moran Stillman (nee Jay) and Chauncey Devereux Stillman. Theo was raised in Manhattan and attended Miss Hewitt's and Chapin girls' schools, where she developed her love for music, art, and science. Theo graduated from Radcliffe College in 1968. Her great compassion for others, however, turned her scientific pursuits to the field of Medicine, and she completed pre-med coursework at Columbia University, began her training at Albany Medical Center, and graduated from UCLA with her medical degree in 1974. Theo and Roy were married on September 16, 1972 in the chapel at Wethersfield, her father's estate in Stanfordville, NY.

Theo was a dedicated and caring doctor concerned for the best interests of those who sought her help, guidance, or advice on medical matters. While balancing her busy career, Theo also took seriously her role as mother and wife, ensuring she was home for dinner and bedtimes most nights, even if it meant having to go back to the hospital late into the night. Theo specialized in General Surgery, with an emphasis on breast cancer.

Theo's love for Brownsville history and the Stillman family was apparent through her annual visits to Brownsville and her devotion to the proper maintenance of the Stillman House Museum. It was Theo's father, Chauncey, who saw to it that the Stillman House open as a museum under the management of the BHA. We, at the BHA, are grateful for Theo's consistent participation in Brownsville preservation efforts over the years and we express our sincere condolences to the family.
